Mr. John Sheehy, solicitor, who died at Haberfield, Australia, aged 80, was a native of Balingarry, Co. Limerick. He practised as a solicitor in Dublin before emigrating to Sydney 51 years ago. He took a leading part there in Catholic and Irish affairs, and was General Secretary of the Irish National Foresters and President of the Irish National Association for many years. Notice to Owners of Mechanically Propelled Road Vehicles.

The Limerick County Council, in pursuance of the powers vested in them under the Road Vehicles (Registration & Licensing) Order, 1921, made under the Roads Act, 1920, hereby warn owners of mechanically propelled road vehicles which are ordinarily kept within the County of Limerick, that immediate steps should be taken to enforce the payment of all outstanding Licence Duty on same.
