### TRIBUTE BY CIRCUIT JUDGE

At the opening of the civil busi-  
ness of Limerick Circuit Court  
yesterday, Judge Fawsitt, S.C., said  
that he wished to refer to the loss  
suffered by the Limerick practi-  
tioners and the Court since he last  
sat in Limerick, in the regretted  
death of Mr. Edward Leahy, solr.,  
at a comparatively early age. Mr.  
Leahy, or, as he was affectionately  
known, "Big Ned Leahy," was big  
in every respect. He was big phy-  
sically and mentally, and in the  
agricultural and sporting life of  
Co. Limerick. His death left a  
void which it would not be easy to  
fill, but they were all glad to know  
that the practice, which was first  
established by his father, the late  
William Leahy, a former Crown  
Solicitor, in 1875, was being con-  
tinued by another member of the  
family.

The Judge asked Mr. A. J. Blood-  
Smyth, as father of the Bar Asso-  
ciation in Limerick, to convey his  
remarks to Mr. Leahy's relatives.

Mr. Blood-Smyth said that the  
late Mr. Ned Leahy was an extre-  
mely popular member of the pro-  
fession, and his lordship had  
described him very accurately. He  
knew Mr. Leahy since he was a  
young man entering his father's  
office, and throughout his life he  
never said a hasty or nasty word  
to anybody. They all deeply re-  
gretted his loss and were glad to  
know that his cousin was carrying  
on the family practice.

Mr. M. Danaher, B.L., and Mr.

joined in the tribute.
