AN APPRECIATION

Stephen Moore is dead and seldom has a place in a district been left so vacant by a soul's departure. The sorrow caused by his death is not confined to Ballinacarriga or nearby Pallas-kenry and Kildimo, because his sterling and amiable qualities made him a popular and respected figure throughout and even outside the county.

Practically two generations ago Stephen Moore took up duty as principal of Ballinacarriga National School and ever since, in school or outside, on duty or in retirement "The Master" was looked on with an affection and respect that amounted almost to reverence. His devotion to the welfare of the numerous pupils committed to his care was equalled only by his constant anxiety for the well-being of his neighbours without distinction of class or creed. His charitable and God-fearing qualities were ever at their disposal—material aid, advice when most needed, or consolation in sorrow—all came from him with the same generosity and sincerity.

"The Master" took a life-long interest in all forms of healthy athletic pastimes and he never spared his organising ability in furthering local Gaelic activities. Greyhound racing was his life-long hobby and who has not heard of his famous "Shannon Grove" of other days? In this connection courting "fans" from far and near who looked forward to hearing annually at Clounanna a few of the apt witticisms that fell so spontaneously from him will miss him as few will be missed.

Is it any wonder then that such a huge concourse of people accompanied Stephen Moore to his last resting place? For in that seemingly unending cortege were countless loving past pupils, neighbours and friends, paying a final tribute to one who was so dear to them and showing their genuine heartfelt sympathy with the family who must sorely miss so noble a father. WHOLE HUSKS

IN FLAKE MEAL

At Newcastle West District Court on Friday, 13th inst., before Mr. C. S. Kenny, B.L., D.J.,

Guard Treacy, Food and Drugs Inspector, summoned P. and J. Ryan, Bridge Street, Newcastle West, for selling rolled oats which was not of the nature, quality and substance demanded.

Mr. R. G. O'Sullivan, solr., appeared for Limerick Co. Council, and Mr. J. T. Liston, solr., defended.

Guard Treacy said that the public analyst reported that the sample contained whole husks, half husks and splinters. In his opinion the amount of impurity in the meal was excessive and was liable to cause injury to the health of the consumer. Good flake meal did not contain husks.

WITNESS CROSS-EXAMINED.

In reply to Mr. Liston, witness said that this was not the first time he purchased rolled oats for analysis.

Mr. Liston—In what respect was this meal to the prejudice of the purchaser?

Justice—If you buy a thing and don't get what you want it is to your prejudice.

In reply to further questions, witness said he did not know the fixed standard for rolled oats.

In reply to Mr. O'Sullivan, witness said he did not expect to get an article that would be injurious to his health.

DECISION ON APPEAL.

Mr. T. E. F. Bennett, solr., said he represented the Oatmeal Millers Association and would like to point out that a similar prosecution was heard in Galway and there was a conviction but on an appeal to the Circuit Court the decision was reversed on the grounds that there was nothing to show that the oatmeal sold was not of the nature and quality demanded by the purchaser. The case was almost analogous with the present one.

Mr. O'Sullivan said that in the case referred to by Mr. Bennett there was a conviction in the District Court but it was dismissed under the P.O.A.

WHAT JUDGE HELD.

Mr. Bennett—We appealed from that decision and the Judge held that the meal was not dangerous to normal persons.

Mr. O'Sullivan—It seems to me that all these cases stand on their own legs. In this case the Inspector expected to get an article which would not be injurious to his health.

Mr. Bennett said that the case he referred to should soon be reported in the "Irish Law Times," and he suggested that the Justice might adjourn his decision until he saw the report.

The Justice said he would adjourn the case to the April Court.
