In hurling and football, Kerry beat Limerick at Tralee on the 3rd August, Mr. F. B. Dineen, refereeing. The scores were—Hurling, Kilmoyley, Robert Emmets, 1 goal 6 points; South Liberties, 1 point. Football—Killorglin, Laune Rangers, 9 points; St. Patricks, nil. There was a huge attendance at the contests.

#### Provincial.

Cork and Kerry played at Limerick on the 28th September, Aghabullogue (Co. Cork) beat Kilmoyley (Co. Kerry), and in football, Middleton and Laune Rangers did not finish their match owing to the fact that the ball burst after fifty-five minutes scoreless play, and could not be replaced. Middleton won by 1 goal and 4 points, to 1 point on the re-play.
