

Tuesday, February, 17th.—Full seasonable entry, good average class, including a number of choice heifers; weather conditions favourable, a fair number of buyers present. Business dragged a bit at the beginning, as vendors held for rates which buyers were not willing to give, and consequently trade was not as active as previous markets, and prices were not as good; secondary heifers did not appeal to buyers, these were tedious and difficult to place; nicely bred promising, soft heifers were wanted and bid for and made around current rates, but all round the average was not up to recent figures. The bulk of the useful heifers changed hands. Dairy cows met a good enquiry; strong demand for young cows with substance and quality. Full average turnover.
