Tuesday, February 24th:—The entry numbered a full seasonable supply; a good class, including some tip-top big heifers with good shapes from well known vendors. On the whole the class was above the ordinary; active enquiry manifest for high grade heifers, for which there was sharp competition. The large and representative attendance present parted freely for the class required, which gave to business a "swing" and activity which kept things moving at top rates; there was no hesitancy in making selections, and when a heifer of true dairy type came into the "ring" she attracted sharp competition, and the buyer had to pay for her. Heifers realising £25 to £30 came in for special attention and, proportionately, drew more money. Care in selection and bringing out well repaid vendors. Business throughout the day was marked by much energy and stability. Prices showed a sharp advance on last Tuesday. Satisfactory wind up. Market practically cleared. In the best of company Mr. M. Power carried off the honours of the day at £34 10s. Vendors advise the same class for next Tuesday, so that buyers will have the right stamp to choose from.
