Salmon anglers in the upper waters of the Feale had poor results on the 1st and the 2nd March, the opening days, as only one 12 lb. spring fish was landed between Kilmorna and Brosna. This disappointment is attributed by the anglers to the disordered condition of the weir at Listowel, where the fish pass requires attention.

G.S.R. RECEIPTS UP

Traffic receipts of the Great Southern Railways show an increase of £2,929 at £87,442 for the week ended February 27. Passenger receipts were £3,787 lower, but goods increased by £6,716. Total receipts to date are £735,677—an increase of £71,607 on last year.
