Wednesday, March 4th:—Cattle—Average entry; class on sale not up to last week. Good attendance. Beef short supply; less bullocks and heifers; well done lots easily sold. Nicely meated fresh cows a ready sale; firm rates and full values. Stores were an ordinary mixed class; not many drafts of strong cattle or promising feeders; mostly young cattle; anything of a useful quality found buyers; forward feeders and aged cattle in strong demand and stiffer rates; well bred two year olds active enquiry, especially choice dairy heifers; no material change in values. Trade worked out on the lines of last week. Full seasonable turnover and good clearance. Fat cows, £18 5s. to £27 10s.; second run, £14 10s. to £17; two and a half year old bullocks and heifers, £19 to £24 10s.; second run, £15 15s. to £17 15s.; two year old bullocks and heifers, £15 15s. to £17; yearlings, £8 17s. 6d. to £9 13s.; second run, £5 to £7 10s.

Sheep—Decreased entry; a fairly useful turnout, with a number of good pens; prime sheep met satisfactory demand, with firm trade. The entry included a share of secondary sheep and pens lacking finish, for which demand was slow. Store sheep a quiet trade; however, well fed useful feeders changed hands; a steady sale for sheep fit for the trade and no difficulty in cashing this class; full recent terms. Ewes hard to cash, unless young and fresh; fair trade. All round, trade did not run as smoothly as last week, though best pens held their own, with a fair, good clearance.
