ANGLERS' COMPLAINT.

Maigue Anglers' Association wrote asking for an inquiry into allegations of poisoning of the Mahore by creamery affluent. They added that last year casual anglers on the Maigue and Camogue made wholesale slaughter of salmon smolts and they asked that this variety of poaching should be stopped.

The Secretary said that he had been informed by the Department that small streams were not regarded as important in comparison with the importance of the creameries, and the view of the Department was that during the emergency they were not going to allow anything to interfere with the creameries. The Department did not intend to make any trouble with a creamery over small matters.

Inspector Breen, in his monthly report, stated that the salmon catches in the lower Shannon were very good, and there was every prospect of a good season. Some of the Limerick anglers had done well, and one man had landed 14 salmon near Ardnacrusha.
