A FATAL FALL

FATHER WITNESSES SON'S DEATH

Mr. M. E. Cussen, solr., Coroner
for West Limerick, with a jury,
held an inquest at Glin Courthouse
on Wednesday into the death of
Cornelius O'Brien (29), Tinnakilla,
who was fatally injured on the 17th
February, when he fell from his
bicycle following a collision with a
pony and trap at Fleanbeg.

Evidence was to the effect that
on the 17th February deceased left
his home on a bicycle and went in
the direction of Glin. While going
down a steep hill at Fleanbeg he
was in collision with a trap, the
property of Roger Behane, follow-
ing which he fell to the ground.
As a result of the fall deceased
sustained a fractured skull and
died shortly afterwards. A tragic
feature of the occurrence was that
Denis O'Brien, father of deceased,
accompanied the owner of the trap
at the time and saw his son meet
his death.

The jury returned a verdict in
accordance with the medical evi-
dence that death was due to shock
and haemorrhage following frac-
ture of the skull.
