**WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.**

Tuesday, March 31st:—Entries showed a substantial increase, being the heaviest of the season. A fair proportion of both heifers and cows, but did not include as many choice heifers; there were, however, up to 100 heifers, generally speaking, of a promising and useful class to select from. There was a strong attendance, several from a distance, with shipping interests operating strongly, all in quest of heifers showing dairy qualities; this description found ready and willing purchasers, with a quick sale. Business opened with an extra strong and active tone; promising and choice heifers were keenly competed for; prices marked a decided advance up to £5 per head, according to quality. Dairy proprietors require heifers nicely brought out, with breeding, and the essential "points." The smaller type of thick, "rosy" heifers with quality and condition were in great demand, and made more money comparatively than the bigger heifer, vendors benefiting accordingly. The supply of choice heifers will be lessening each week as the season advances, so that parties requiring this stamp ought not to put off buying too long. There was a decided impetus in the sale of in-calf cows, springers and milchers, which gave a "jump" to values; a busy atmosphere, with steady trade, marked the day's proceedings, and a much greater volume of business transacted than last Tuesday, with a strong wind-up and practical clearance. Mr. Wm. Torpey, Clonlara, topped the market for an extra choice heifer at £36. Top price for dairy cows went to Mr. A. J. Sexton, 64 O'Connell Street, and Mr. James O'Malley, Lackareigh, Killaloe, at £33. Choice heifers, £30 to £36; promising, £25 to £29 10s.; ordinary, £19 10s. to £24 10s.; dairy cows, best, £27 to £33; promising, £23 10s. to £26 10s.; ordinary, £15 5s. to £22 10s.—Wm. B.
