## THE PADDOCKS, LIMERICK. WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, April 8th:—Cattle—The entry at the same as last week; ordinary description, but hardly up to the same standard as last Wednesday. In beef department, shortage of heifers and bullocks; trade ve and firm; a greater number of cows. Fresh young cows met a brisk trade, with appreciable competition; full values ruled; lots practically cleared. Plenty of buyers to absorb all beef; secondary and old lots met a slower trade. In stores section, good supply of forward stores, which met satisfactory trade at best rates. In young cattle there was a steady sale for nice looking and dairy heifers, also bullocks; firm prices. Yearlings an average show; those in shapes and colour were in keen request at top values; prices well maintained with a tendency. Good steady trade for useful stores. Cattle wanting shapes and condition. Business in general worked out around week's terms and routine. Market fairly cleared. Fat cows, best, £26 to £28 15s.; second run, £19 to £25 10s.; old, £10s. to £18; two and a half year old bullocks, £16 to £23 10s.; two year old bullocks and heifers, £15 5s. to £18 5s.; third run, £9 15s. to £15; yearlings, £7 10s. to £9 7s. 6d.; small, £4 to £7 7s. 6d.

**Sheep**—Average seasonable supply; not as many well fed sheep as last week; all the sheep there were quite a number of pens of good quality; steady trade; suitable selections readily bid for; medium weights found most popular; no material change in values. Fresh lambs bid for and cashed. Hoggets as active. All round enquiry well sustained.
