MISSING WOMAN

FOUND DEAD IN STREAM

On Wednesday evening of last week (writes our Athea corres- pondent) Mrs. Moore, who resided with her husband and family in a cottage at Lower Athea, was found to be missing from her home. A search, in which the Garda assis- ted, was at once instituted, but no trace of the missing woman could be discovered. Early next morning, however, her body was found by one of her daughters lying face downwards in a nearby stream. Help was immediately summoned but nothing could be done, for it was evident that the poor woman had been dead for some time. It is assumed that the deceased must have been crossing the stream in question, when she was rendered unconscious by a sudden seizure or other, which caused her to fall helplessly into the current.

The deceased was a hard-work- ing industrious woman, who was well liked by everybody in the locality. The news of her tragic demise has caused a profound shock throughout the neighbour- hood, where the deepest sympathy is expressed for the bereaved hus- band and family.

BRUFF COURT CASE

At Bruff District Court, before Mr. H. L. Connor, B.L., D.J., Thomas Murphy, Kilballyowen, was summoned for having in his possession two ornamental trees, value £2, the property of R. Hurley, Patrickswell.

Michael Hurley said that he acted as caretaker for his father at Lough Gur and in March he missed three ornamental trees from the front of the house. Later he identified some of the trees at defendant's place.

Guard Skehan said that he found the trees growing on defendant's land. Murphy made a statement that he found the trees in an out- house and that he did not know who brought them there. He was under the impression that his son goth them. He took full respon- sibility for being in possession of the trees. He was prepared to give them back any time.

The Justice said that he would allow the defendant three months in which to pay 30/- to the owner of the trees.
