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### DEATH OF MASTER R. A. GALBRAITH.

Deep and heartfelt sympathy will be extended to Mr. Peter and Mrs. Galbraith, Washington Terrace, New Street, Limerick, on the death of their only son, Roland Arthur ('Ro'), which took place early this morning in Barrington's Hospital after a prolonged illness.
