MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE

Before Judge O'Donnell, at the
Clare Circuit Court,

Thomas McDonagh, Lisdoonvarna,
pleaded "Not Guilty" to a charge
of manslaughter.

Evidence was given that when
driving a motor lorry from Lis-

load of Clare phosphates, the de-
fendant met a boy named Joseph
Bennis (16), Ennistymon, in charge
of a donkey and cart, on his way
to the bog. The lorry crashed into
the donkey and cart, owing to a
defect in the steering, and inflicted
fatal injuries on Bennis.

Accused was acquitted by the
jury, and the Judge said he agreed
with their verdict.
