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v of tracing rates of 24. and 30. and the 1d. step in the rate for large scale cooking. Domestic consumption (excluding water-heating) accounted for 26 million units in to period May to September, 1941. Water-heating in the same period u ad 8½ million units, a total of 34½ million units sold or the equivalent of 40,000 tons of coal. The total amount sold for all purposes during the period was 93 million units. In these five months of 1941 domestic consumption (excluding water-heating) increased by 27% over the previous summer, while waterheating was up by 50%. It is essential, therefore, to discourage any serious increase this summer and to endeavour to secure a substantial decrease.

BOG WORK WAGES

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REPLY TO LIMERICK DEPUTY

In the Dail, Mr. M. J. Keves (Labour, Limerick) asked the Minister for Finance if he received from Limerick Co. Council copy of a resolution adopted unanimously by them in which they recommend that the wages payable to turfworkers be increased to 7/- per day, and, if so, whether he will state what action he proposes taking in regard to this recommendation.

The Minister, in reply, said:—A copy of resolution in the terms stated was received and the whole question of the level of wages for turf production in relation to other occupations is under consideration.

FOR ARBITRATION BOARD

When the Ennis United Labourers' Association applied to Mr. D. O'Keeffe, the Commissioner for Clare, to increase the wages of carters by 1/6 per hour, he pointed out that the application should first be addressed to the Arbitration Board specially set up to deal with such matters. He would accept what the Board approved of but could not at present do anything with the application in view of the Standstill Order.

TO ENFORCE PAYMENT

Certain persons in Ennis who are using the town water supply for other than domestic purposes refuse to pay on the meter system. The Urban Council has directed the collector to take legal proceedings to enforce payment.
