Breach Of Tillage Order

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DANGEROUS DRIVING CASE

At Croom Court on Tuesday, before District Justice Kenny, **B.L.**, Gunner John Cunningham was summoned for driving a lorry in a dangerous manner at Skagh, Croom, on 9th October.

Guard Keogh stated that on 9th October he visited the scene of an accident where he saw the lorry and three hay floats on the road facing Croom.

William Breen said that he was drawing hay with two other men. A motor car came from the Croom direction and when it had passed he was struck from behind. The shafts of the float were broken and his leg was broken.

John Guiltinan stated that as he was driving from Croom he saw a light approaching and he dimmed his lights. After he had passed he heard a crash.

DID NOT DIM LIGHTS.

Defendant stated that as he was drawing towards the car he dimmed but the oncoming car failed to dim. He dimmed again as a signal to the other car but the other car did not dim. As he passed this car he saw something in front of him and he swung his lorry to avoid it and struck something.

Lieut. M. Jones, who was sitting beside the defendant, said that the lights of the oncoming car dazzled both himself and the driver.

The Justice said he believed that defendant was blinded to a certain extent and that accounted for what happened. He would impose a fine of 10/- for driving without due care and attention.

Thos. Lynch, Inchinclare, Croom, was summoned for a breach of the Tillage Order.

Mr. J. J. Power, State Solicitor, prosecuted, and Mr. W. A. Lee, solr., was for defendant.

Mr. Power said that defendant's quota was 10 acres.

MR. MICHAEL J. O'SULLIVAN.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Michael J. O'Sullivan, which took place at his residence, "Eureka," Baliysimon Road, after a prolonged illness.—R.L.P. Deceased, who was only 29 years old, was until recently on the staff of the Scottish Legal Assurance Co. His genial disposition made him deservedly popular and his demise has caused widespread sorrow. A staunch member of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family, he led a model Christian life and went to his final reward fortified by the rites of Holy Church. He was a keen follower of rugby and played with Christians and later captained Limerick County.
