Tuesday, May 19th—Full seasonable supply, with fair proportion of heifers; entry average class; plenty of buyers for all useful and promising lots on sale, which found ready exchange. Steady enquiry for nice promising heifers, not toppers, but the short-legged shapely heifer; this class with colour and quality were bid for and bought freely; supply not up to demand. Rates better than last week. Choice heifers also met good competition and were readily sold. Demand for dairy cows of the right stamp. Old and secondary cows hard to place. Over the day's proceedings there was good all round selling trade. Satisfactory clearance. Top price of the market went to Mr. G. Harris, Ballykisteen, at £29 10s. CATTLE MARKETS, MULGRAVE STREET, LIMERICK.

Weekly Market, Saturday, May 16th—Dairy cows and in-calf heifers, substantial increase in entries; an unusually choice lot in both departments, especially in the dairy cows; in spite of the heavy entry a big number were sold; bidding not quite as brisk as previous markets. Top price was obtained by Mr. S. Campbell at £25 10s., the runner-up being Mr. C. McNamara, Singland, at £24 15s. Dairy cows and in-calf heifers, best, £23 15s. to £25 10s.; second run, £21 10s. to £23; others, £19 10s. to £20 15s.; small, £14 10s. to £17 10s.

Stores—A heavy increase in this department; trade easier, resulting in a good many passing out unsold. Two year old heifers and bullocks, small, £12 12s. 6d. to £14 10s.; others, £8 17s. 6d. to £11 10s.
