DEATH OF MR. A. NESTOR.

The death of Mr. Alexander (Alec) Nestor, one of Limerick's leading citizens, which took place in Cork on Sunday after a prolonged illness, has occasioned widespread regret and sorrow. A gentleman of many estimable parts, he was a general favourite, and the news of his demise, though not unexpected, came as a shock to his hosts of friends. Second son of the late Mr. A. Nestor, Sportsmen's Warehouse - Tobacconist, O'Connell Street, Limerick, he was a keen business man and under his direction the business of Nestor Bros. continued to expand. Very deep sympathy will be extended to the widow and family in their bereavement.

The remains were removed from Cork to Limerick on Monday and the interment took place yesterday in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. The funeral cortege from St. Michael's Church was of huge proportions, testifying in a very striking way as to the popularity of the deceased.
