THE PADDOCKS, LIMERICK. WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, June 3rd—Cattle—Entry showed a substantial increase on last week's register. Representative attendance. Larger supply of beef, especially nice medium weighted heifers; well meated young cows readily placed; full current values; all cleared. A healthier and firmer tone in general position of market for fat and forward lots; appreciable competition, with energy and stability, and a dearer tendency noticeable. Enquiry for useful drafts of stores, which changed hands. Buyers showed a business-like disposition; advanced rates over last week. Proceedings opened actively, with a busy aspect throughout the day; heifers showing two teeth met brisk enquiry and competition. Business for useful stock was buoyant and firm, with marked competition and steady selling trade, rates indicating confirmation of recent improved position and stability in prices. Transactions totalled a substantial volume and good clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £26 15s. to £29 15s.; second run, £22 5s. to £24 5s.; fat cows, best, £22 5s. to £25 10s.; second run, £15 to £20 10s.; two year old heifers and bullocks, best, £16 5s. to £20 5s.; second run, £11 7s. to £14 7s. 6d.; yearlings, best, £11 to £13 17s. 6d.; second run, £8 2s. 6d. to £10 17s. 6d.

Sheep—Numbers about the same as last market; fair supply of useful sheep and a few pens of prime mutton. Average attendance of buyers; firm enquiry for best pens. Hoggets of nice quality and well fed met steady exchange at satisfactory terms; useful sheep looked for; ample demand to take all shown. Young ewes sold well; old ewes lower rates. Less stores than last week; a quiet trade; scarcity of fat lambs; useful thick sorts with quality freely bid for. Market practically sold up.
