Canon J. Wall agreed and said that the full list of the herbs available should be supplied to each teacher.

Canon T. Wall said that the list of herbs should be also printed in Irish. Such a list had been prepared during the last war and it should now be availed of.

Chairman—A lot of these herbs throughout the county would be known by their Irish names.

Canon T. Wall—A lot of them would be known more by their Irish names than by their English definitions.

The Committee decided to make arrangements to have a specimen collection of herbs made in each school area in the county.
