NUN KILLED

Shocking Tragedy

NEAR SIXMILEBRIDGE

A shocking tragedy occurred near Belvoir, Sixmilebridge, last evening when a nun, Sister Mary Clare O'Donovan, aged 29 years, a member of the Mercy Order, was killed as a result of an accident to a pony trap.

A most poignant feature of the tragedy was the fact that the deceased had only recently come from England to spend a brief holiday at home and to be present at the ordination of her brother, Rev. Matthew O'Donovan, at Thurles last Sunday week.

Accompanied by her father, Mr. John O'Donovan, who resides at Murroe, deceased last evening drove to the residence of her uncle, Mr. John Gleeson, at Belvoir.

TRAP OVERTURNED.

When about a hundred yards from the residence the pony suddenly shied and swerved to the right-hand side of the road. The wheel of the car mounted the fence and the trap turned over. Both deceased and her father were pitched out on to the road, Sister Mary Clare sustaining injuries which proved fatal.

Though not actual witnesses of the accident deceased's mother and sister, accompanied by Mr. John Gleeson, were following in another trap.

Medical assistance was immediately summoned and Dr. Flynn, Kilkishen, arrived within fifteen minutes of the occurrence, but life was then extinct.

Medical examination subsequently revealed that she had sustained a broken neck and that death appeared to have been instantaneous.

INQUEST HELD TO-DAY.

At an inquest held in Sixmilebridge to-day a verdict was returned in accordance with the medical evidence.

The medical evidence showed that deceased died from fracture of the cervical spine.

Evidence was also given by Mr. J. Gleeson and Guard Murphy.

The Coroner, Dr. D. Scanlan, Tulla, and Sergeant Daly (on behalf of Supt. Murray and the Guards) joined in expressing sympathy to the relatives.

LIMERICK RELATIVES.

Deceased had been attached to the Wamstead House of the Mercy Order in London. She was niece of Mr. Philip O'Donovan, ex-Mayor of Limerick, and of Mr. J. Gleeson, licensed vintner, O'Connell Street, Limerick, with whom and the numerous other relatives the deepest sympathy is extended.

Battle For Sebastopol

ATTACK ON EGYPT IMMINENT?

General Von Boch is making a determined bid to break up the Russian forces at Kharkov, according to messages received to-day from Moscow. It is added that he has failed in his objective despite the fact that 400,000 fresh German troops have been thrown into the fighting.

The Moscow wireless stated to-day that the Germans were forced to retire at different points after having suffered heavy losses.

GERMAN COMMUNIQUE.

To-day's German communique says that the Russians are falling back at Kharkov, and that the last ring of fortifications at Sebastopol has been reached.

According to the Soviet communique the Red Army is withstanding successfully greatly superior German forces at Sebastopol.

The British communique from Cairo says that yesterday, on the Libya side of the Egyptian frontier, small advanced German forces were encountered by British patrols.

ROMMEL TO ATTACK EGYPT.

A News Agency message from Cairo states there are indications that Marshal Rommel intends to launch an attack on Egypt by passing Fort Capuzzo and Halfaya.

The British Air Ministry stated to-day that squadrons of the R.A.F. attacked centres in Western Germany during the night. Three planes failed to return.

BACON SHORTAGE

Bacon supplies in Dublin for over a week now have not been sufficient to meet the demand. One merchant, who claims to require over one hundred pigs each week, reports that at present he is now permitted to kill and cure only that number in a month. It is probable that a rationing system for bacon will have to be introduced, for the general practice seems to be to give customers rashers. Bacon for boiling is very difficult to get.
