ABUSIVE LANGUAGE CASE

At Limerick City Court to-day, before District Justice J. M. Flood, B.L.,

Michael Tubridy, 3 Upper Ellen Street, summoned Stephen Clarke, Hibernian Hotel, Davis Street, for abusive language on 10th June.

Mr. D. J. O'Malley, solicitor, appeared for complainant, and Mr. T. E. O'Donnell, solicitor, defended.

The complainant stated that some time ago, following a separation between Clarke and his wife, he went to security for Mrs. Clarke for the tenancy of her house. Her husband took exception to this and ever since he had given the complainant a bad time. Clarke had made very serious unfounded allegations, and on 10th June he threatened to shoot the complainant.

Clarke stated that Tubridy was constantly at whist drives with Mrs. Clarke.

Mr. O'Donnell—Do you take strong exception to the complainant meeting your wife?—Yes.

Mr. O'Malley—There is no foundation for these charges. Mr. Tubridy merely did a good service to Mrs. Clarke, and for that he is being persecuted.

POPULAR RACING OFFICIAL

LATE MR. E. P. HARTY

The death of Mr. Edward P. Harty, of Pallas, Co. Limerick, which came with tragic suddenness, has caused a profound shock not only in County Limerick but throughout Munster, and for that matter, in all parts of the country. A member of a very old and popular racing family, Mr. Harty became interested in racing affairs early in life and rode with much success as an amateur. He was a cousin of the famous family of horsemen, which included Henry and George Harty and Captain Cyril Harty. On the death of the late Mr. Jack Hartigan he succeeded that capable official in the management of Limerick Junction and Mallow meetings, and by an unflagging industry and intimate knowledge of the needs of owners and trainers he rapidly established these two meetings in a wide popularity. Indeed, only a few weeks back he was co-opted on the directorate of Limerick Junction meeting, a tribute to the invaluable services which he had rendered to that company.

In social life the deceased had few equals and his company, because of his genial disposition, camaraderie and esprit de corps, was in constant demand by an ever-increasing circle of friends.
