Wednesday, July 1st:—Cattle—Entry numbered something less than last week; good average description; bullock and heifer beef easily placed at full terms, also nicely done fresh heiferish cows; older sorts and stripper cows met a slow trade. Forward stores of the right stamp found willing purchasers. The shortage of grass had its effect on the store cattle trade, which moved in a quiet routine, and was a bit disappointing. Enquiry and exchange for shapely forward feeders, also for coloury dairy heifers, which met a fair selling trade. Yearlings came in for attention, but all round the store trade was not quite up to last week; plainer sorts difficult to cash. Rates around previous level. Average attendance. Fat heifers and bullocks, £21 5s. to £28; second run, £18 to £20 15s.; fat cows, £21 to £25 5s.; second run, £13 12s. 6d. to £18 10s.; two and a half year old bullocks and heifers, best, £18 12s. 6d. to £22 15s.; second run, £15 to £16 15s.; yearlings, best, £7 2s. to £10 2s. 6d.

Sheep—A decrease on last week; a good average useful class, including some pens of nice quality; steady trade; suitable selections freely bid for. Hoggets preferred; medium weights found most favour and full previous terms paid. Well done fat lambs wanted and a good trade. Usual attendance. All cleared.
