DEATH OF MR. J. KIELY, FARRANSHONE

With the deepest sorrow we announce the death of Mr. James Kiely, Farranville, Farranshone, Limerick, who died in Barrington's Hospital on Wednesday night after a prolonged illness. The deceased was a highly popular figure and deservedly enjoyed the respect, confidence and esteem of all who knew him. An exemplary Catholic, he was a model husband and father, and was never happier than when doing some good turn or helping some worthy cause.

He was for years on the staff of the grocery and provision establishment of Richard Ray, Ltd., Roche's Street, and in his business capacity he had, as he merited, the golden opinions of both the firm and its customers. In private life he was an exceedingly kind, courteous and charitable man and was most energetic and unselfish in assisting any movement calculated to benefit the community. A staunch member of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family, he was particularly zealous and active in helping church ceremonies and functions of all kinds. Always thoughtful and considerate towards those in distress, he was particularly helpful to the poor, of whose cause he was ever a willing and practical champion and supporter. He was a prominent and valued figure in the G.A.A., being Chairman of the Treaty Club and Registrar of the City Board. Frequently, too, he acted as referee, and in this capacity was capable and impartial to the highest degree. When the Red Cross Society was established in Limerick he became one of its earliest members and gave loyal and useful services to it up to his illness. He was in every sense a fine type of citizen and Irishman, being the possessor of a rare combination of admirable qualities. To his bereaved wife, family and other relatives we extend our very sincere sympathy on their great sorrow.

The remains of deceased were removed at 8 o'clock last evening from Barrington's Hospital to St. Munchin's Church. A special guard of honour of the Red Cross in uniform accompanied them, the members of that body marching including Mr. P. F. Quinlan, B.C., and Mr. F. G. O'Reilly, chairman and secretary, respectively, of the Limerick Branch.

The coffin was draped with the Red Cross flag, on top of which rested the Red Cross cap and belt of the deceased. The attendance of the general public was of huge dimensions and widely representative.

The funeral will take place from
