Several beautiful floral tributes were given, as well as Mass cards by pals of deceased. May she rest in peace.

### ABBEYFEALE DECISION

A large meeting representative of the traders, professions and general public was held at St. Ita's C.Y.M.S. Hall, Abbeyfeale, for the purpose of arranging a Carnival Week in the town to aid in reducing the debt incurred in the building of the curates' houses.

Very Rev. T. Canon Hogan, P.F., V.F., presided, and Rev. J. Houlihan, C.C., and Rev. W. J. Meade, C.C., were also present.

Appointments formally made were:—Secretaries, Messrs. J. Fitzgibbon and D. Murphy. Committee—Dr. Ed. Harnett, Messrs. J. Lee, Manager, Provincial Bank; D. O'Neill, Eugene O'Rourke, James Collins and J. M. Browne.

Rev. J. Houlihan, C.C., explained that the Carnival would include a great variety of the best attractions—all kinds of indoor and outdoor forms of amusement. Athletics would include hurling and football by some well known Munster combinations; pony races, harnessed or otherwise. These and the stocking of stalls, etc., were discussed as suggestions to the committee. Amongst other things a lorry load of turf, to be delivered anywhere within 40 or 50 miles of Abbeyfeale, would be contributed by Mr. James Collins.

The date will be fixed later to suit the owner of the marquee and general amusements plant. The arranging for the site and other matters were referred to the committee.
