FATAL INJURIES

YOUNG MAN DRAGGED BY HORSE

While James Roche, aged 19, employed by Mr. E. Hennessy, Kilfinane, was engaged yoking a horse to a milk cart the animal plunged. Roche got tangled in the reins and was dragged along as the horse raced through the yard. He received severe face and body injuries. A nurse rendered first aid. Dr. J. Ryan and Father Tynan, C.C., arrived soon after. Roche was immediately conveyed to Croom Hospital, where he died a few days later. He was a member of the L.D.F., members of whom with the L.S.F. marched at his funeral at Kilfinane.
