CRASH AT BRIDGE GAELS AND THEIR GAMES

How Soldier Was Killed Manslaughter Charge CASE AT SPECIAL COURT

At a special court in Adare on Saturday, before District Justice Kenny, B.L., Army Sergt. M. Cunningham was charged with the manslaughter of Private John Healy at Cragbeg, Clarina, on 15th April, by recklessly driving a motor lorry.

In reply to Mr. O'Donovan, Tynan said that he had also examined Sergt. Cunningham, who was unconscious on admission to hospital, had injuries on the body, and remained in hospital six weeks.
