**WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET**

Wednesday, July 15th:—Cattle—Supply on the larger side, with more heifer and bullock beef than is usual for this season. A good attendance. Business opened active in the beef section; nice medium weight heifers and bullocks readily placed at full terms, heifers meeting a preference. Young fresh cows were a steady trade; others not as much in favour. The general run of business in this section showed a healthy tone; money position, compared with recent markets, was somewhat firmer; all nice lots changed hands. In store cattle, best grades drew rates favourable to sellers, especially two year old and yearling heifers, which had ready buyers; bullocks, unless of the right stamp, harder to place. All round, values well maintained; anything in the shape of a useful feeder got sold. Over the day a steady selling trade, with a good clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £23 5s. to £27 5s.; second run, £18 to £22 10s.; fat cows, best, £23 to £29 15s.; second run, £13 to £21 10s.; two and a half year old bullocks and heifers, small, £15 2s. 6d. to £16 15s.; one and a half year olds, best, £11 12s. to £14 5s.; second run, £8 7s. to £10 1s.

Sheep—Slight decrease in numbers and not as good a class; steady selling trade; well fed sheep in demand and easily cashed, with competition; prices around recent currencies: comparative value not less; good sheep are wanted. Best hoggets enquired for and sold freely, full rates; secondary, sorts slow. Young ewes a good trade. More stores and lambs shown and met a quieter demand, though nearly all pens were cashed around previous level. Trade well supported and market fairly well cleared. Fat middle weight, 82/6 to 86/3; second run, 74/- to 80/-; hoggets, best, 83/- to 90/-; second run, 70/- to 79/-; ewes, best, 70/- to 76/-; second run, 45/- to 60/-; lambs, best, 40/- to 52/-; second run, 37/6 to 43/-.—Wm.
