LIMITED DEMAND

Competition and demand were limited last week at Cahirmee horse fair, which lacked its old-time display. Northern Ireland buyers were altogether absent; Messrs. Riordan (Lewes) were the only cross-Channel representatives. Eire buyers were Messrs. O'Donnell (Buttevant), White and Cooper (Dublin), Murphy and Morgan (Waterford), Doyle (Limerick). Agricultural horses were in rather plentiful supply and changed hands between Munster farmers at from £25 to £35, but, with the arrival of dealers, there was a noticeable liveliness, when exceptional figures of £60 and £70 were returned for heavy horses of the brewery type. Fat horses for export realised £10 to £15, and light animals of varied age, outside the scope of necessary permits, £5 to £15. Harness cobs and ponies, in fair request, brought £15 to £20.
