Sister M. Dominic Wallace, Presentation Convent, Limerick, passed away on Monday. Her death is deeply regretted by the Community as well as by her relatives and numerous friends. shop debts was given by District Justice Conner at Hospit Court. The case was one in which Thomas Walsh, Hospital, claimed £5 is. 11d. from Michael Downes, Oldtown, for drapery goods. It transpired that the account had been barred by the Statute of Limitations but that afterwards four payments of 7/- each on account had been made.

Mr. R. Fox (for Mr. T. M. Mitchell, solicitor) defending, contended that once the Statute had commenced to run any payment made thereafter would not revive the debt.

Mr. Laurence Walsh (Messrs. Bennett and Walsh, solicitors), for plaintiff, quoted from the legal texts on the subject that a payment made after the Statute had run would revive the debt.

His Worship upheld the plaintiff's claim and gave a decree for the amount claimed.

WARRANTY ACTION

At Charleville Court, before District Justice Kenny, Thomas Treacy, Parnell Street, Limerick, sued Stephen Hickey, cattle dealer, Ballysally, for £19 7s. 6d. for alleged breach of warranty in the sale of a heifer. Plaintiff's case was that he bought heifers in Tipperary from defendant, and that the latter said none of them was in calf. Later one of the heifers proved in calf and she died. The defendant denied that he gave any engagement—that when plaintiff asked him he said how could he engage them as he was only after buying them himself. The District Justice said there was "terrific swearing" and he would have to think the case out and give his decision at the next court.

TALENTED YOUNG LIMERICK ARTIST

Mr. Eamon Costelloe, the young Limerick artist, has again distinguished himself by winning for the second time the Taylor Art Scholarship. Mr. Costelloe has already won several other prizes and is a credit to the City Technical School, where he received his early tuition. He is already fulfilling a contract for the Wexford Board of Health in the painting of a set of Stations of the Cross for Ennis-corthy Cathedral.

DOMESTIC SCIENCE

Defendant, who works for a farmer, was bound over for 12 months in his own bond of £2. A charge against Bridget Crowe, domestic servant, of alleged larceny of an L.D.F. cape by finding was partially heard and adjourned for the attendance of defendant.

Ryan, publicans, Cappamore, were fined at Pallas District Court by Mr. Flood, D.J., £1, and men found on the premises were fined 2/6 each. It was urged for the defence by Mr. O'Malley, solr., that a carnival was in progress in Cappamore at the time and that the publicans simply wanted to accommodate the people.

A NOBLE SERVICE

A Limerick priest, Rev. Joseph McCarthy, Mill Hill Fathers, who has just arrived in the city from England on a visit to his mother, Mrs. McCarthy, proprietress of McCarthy's restaurant, Cecil St., brought with him by request of the medical staff of the Limerick Mental Hospital a special drug used in the treatment of mental disorders.

The medical staff, learning that Father McCarthy was about to leave England for home, got into telephonic communication with him and solicited his help in procuring a certain drug obtainable only at a famous British mental institution. This drug, to be effective, must be used within sixty hours of its release, hence the vital importance of securing the services of a dependable person to take charge of the precious medicine. Father McCarthy readily acceded to the urgent and pressing request made to him, secured the drug and had it safely deposited at the Limerick Mental Hospital within thirty-six hours from the time it was handed to him.

FINED £25 FOR TILLAGE DEFAULT

At Mitchelstown Court, before Mr. G. P. Farrell, B.L., D.J., Timothy Murphy, of Kildorrery, was charged with a breach of the tillage regulations.

Mr. Carroll, solicitor for defendant, said that he was admitting the offence, but he was putting forward extenuating circumstances. The defendant did a considerable amount of tillage. He did not actually till one-fifth, but because he was the owner of some brood mares and also was a butcher he was aware that he was entitled to certain exemptions. The mistake he made was that he did not apply for the exemptions.

The Justice said that, taking all circumstances into account, he could not impose less than a fine of £25.
