

## THE PADDOCKS, LIMERICK WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET

Wednesday, July 22nd:—Cattle—Heavier supplies, which included some nice heifers and bullocks, and more fat cows on offer. Trade in the beef section was firm, especially for nice handy weights, which sold freely at recent quotations; cow beef not so active, unless for really choice animals, which were easily cashed; in most cases vendors held for higher rates, which were not easily maintained; finished lots met steady exchange. In the store cattle section strong cattle with condition met ready customers, and more of this class could have been sold. The entry in young stores included a number of useful drafts. Yearling heifers were in strong demand and sold well, also bullocks of the right stamp; rough and backward cattle difficult to negotiate. All round, trade followed a repetition of last week and full current rates maintained. Full attendance of buyers and a good clearance effected. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £26 to £29; second run, £20 5s. to £23 15s.; fat cows, £20 10s. to £25; second run, £17 5s. to £19; two and a half year olds, £21 15s. to £24; two year olds, £15 to £18; yearlings, best, £13 8s. to £16; second run, £8 17s. to £11.

Sheep—Entry showed a decrease on last market; a fairly useful selection. Usual attendance. Pens of nice quality hoggets met ready demand; full rates and easily cashed, with competition. Sheep short of condition, demand not as active. Choice sheep are wanted; best hoggets enquired for and sold freely. Young fresh ewes also sold well. Well done fat lambs a short supply, and met steady trade. Store lambs maintained prices. Market well cleared. Fat middle weight, 87/- to 93/-; second run, 63/- to 74/-; hoggets, best, 86/- to 95/-; second run, 73/- to 78/-; ewes, best, 77/- to 79/-; second run, 63/- to 68/-; lambs, fat, 58/- to 73/-; stores, 37/6 to 45/-.—Wm.
