## DIED IN NEW YORK

The death took place recently in

a prosperous business in New York.  
The last surviving member of a  
family of ten, he was brother of the  
late Very Rev. James M. Canon  
Cregan, P.P., V.F., St. Munchin's,  
Limerick, and of the late Mother  
Bernardine, of the Mercy Convent,  
Limerick. He had hosts of friends  
on both sides of the Atlantic and  
enjoyed the respect, confidence and  
esteem of all classes.

## MAKING BOOT TIPS AT RATHKEALE.

Blacksmiths at Rathkeale (writes  
our correspondent there) are now  
turning out tips for boots in re-  
sponse to a demand from local boot-  
makers, who, owing to war condi-  
tions, are unable to get supplies  
elsewhere. The hand-made tips  
are, I am told, proving most satis-  
factory; equal in finish, they are  
considered better in quality than  
the factory-made article.
