

CYCLING ACCIDENTS

James Rodges, labourer (33), Rathkelly, Newtownstewart, was fatally injured in a bicycle accident on Saturday night. When descending a hill he lost control, and sustained a fractured skull. He died later in Tyrone County Hospital. Herbert McKeegan, travelling watchmaker, believed to be a native of Co. Dublin, was admitted to Tyrone Hospital on Saturday suffering from serious head injuries, received through a collision with a truck when cycling. He had recently been residing in Dromore, Tyrone. His condition is dangerous.

DEATH OF SUPT. P. H. CASEY

The death took place (suddenly) late on Saturday night of Supt. P. H. Casey, Garda Síochána, Ennis. He had been on duty until 11 o'clock that night. A native of Stokestown, Supt. Casey formerly served in the R.I.C. When stationed in Kildare he was associated with the I.R.A. On the inception of the Garda Síochána, he was appointed an officer and had served as Superintendent in Castlebar, Tralee and for 11½ years in Ennis.
