Wednesday, September 2nd—Cattle—Larger numbers than last week, and a better class. Strong attendance of buyers. Beef, including young fresh cows, wanted and sold well; a greater number of strong cattle. Export and local interests fully represented. Useful 2½ year old bullocks found ready buyers. More life and energy in trade, with active enquiry, advanced rates all round. Well bred feeders easily cashed; good enquiry and ready exchange for young store cattle; the right type of well bred feeders in active demand; secondary and plain grade stores also changed hands. Good all round selling trade; much heavier volume of business transacted. Strong finish, satisfactory clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £26 5s. to £29 10s.; second run, £22 10s. to £24 15s.; 2½ year old heifers and bullocks, small, £17 10s. to £19 5s.; second run, £15 to £16; cows, £13 10s. to £17 10s.; strippers, £7 10s. to £9 15s.; 1½ year old bullocks, best, £14 10s. to £15; second run, £12 10s. to £13; ½ year old heifers, £13 10s. to £15 10s.; second run, £9 to £12 15s.

Sheep—Full seasonable entry, including large proportion of good sheep. Prices worked out on the lines of last week, although all round average rates were hardly so firm; condition and quality well represented, and found buyers. Medium weights commanded most attention, and sold at full rates. More stores shown and cashed at current values. Young ewes a good selling trade. Short supply of lambs, useful sorts both fat and stores met fair enquiry and sale. Well fed sheep with quality wanted. Over the day steady trade, in which all classes benefited; value position about maintained. Business in this section wound up satisfactory, and a good clearance effected.
