Wednesday, September 16th:—Cattle—Considerably more on sale than last week; all pens and accommodation occupied. A large proportion of beef and strong cattle; an excellent show of young stores; class well presented. Strong attendance of buyers. Beef readily cashed; medium weights of nice quality in strong demand at top rates; supply met up to requirements. Young cows, well done, easily cashed; secondary and older sorts also met ready exchange. Two and a half year old bullocks and heifers firm demand. In the young store cattle section a much better "take"; trade showed more activity and cohesion in prices and with sharper demand; a ready repetition of previous values, with appreciable competition; choicer lots met a good selling trade at slightly advanced rates. Business all round wore a brighter and busier aspect, with a much greater volume of business transacted than last Wednesday. A record turnover and clearance.
