Chairman—Which means, I presume, that the County Council has nothing to do with it.

DEPARTMENTS' ATTITUDE.

The Manager said his first impression was that the sub-division of the area was a matter for the County Council. He was supported in that view by the Law Agent, but the Department was of a different opinion. He had interviewed the officials of the Ministry with regard to this question of sub-division and ascertained that the Minister was opposed to it on the ground that the income from each one-third area would be only about £150 per year. Such a salary, the Minister thought, would not be adequate for a rate collector if the collection was to be done efficiently. He impressed on the Department the views of the Council and he got the impression that the Minister would be prepared to sanction the division of the area into two districts. However, sanction had not come to hand.

Mr. Quish—It is peculiar that the Department won't sanction £150 a year seeing that they have already done so.

Manager—When did that arise? Mr. Quish—Within the past few months. I propose that we ask the Department to re-consider their decision.

Mr. Power, seconding, said that a salary of £3 per week for an unemployed man could not be regarded as unworthy of acceptance. They had plenty of unemployed in the country, and if the Kilmallock area was divided into three districts three pretty goods jobs would be created instead of one.

Chairman—I don't know what good a proposition will do, seeing that we have nothing to do with the question. I'm all in favour of three districts instead of one, but the Department won't be guided by us. Rate collectors, as a rule, are not depending on their incomes. They have something else—a bit of land or a shop.

THE PRIMARY MOTIVE.

Senator Madden said that the primary motive in dividing the area into three districts was to ensure greater efficiency in the collection. From experience they learned that the bigger the collection areas the greater the difficulties in efficient collections.

Mr. Quish—The Department has already sanctioned a case of £150 a year within the past two months.

Mr. O'Donnell—In that case the area already existed. That is a different case altogether.

Mr. McCormack said that the Council were anxious to divide the Kilmallock area as they considered that a warrant of £20,000 was too big. The Department was now prepared, as it would seem, to divide the area in two, and he thought the Council should be satisfied with that.

Mr. Quaid—If this thing keeps going as it is no rates will be collected in the Kilmallock area before Christmas.

Mr. Quish—The Minister should not hesitate to divide the district into three parts in view of all the young men that are fleeing the country.

Mr. Hayes—£3 per week is far better than 30/-, the wage of the road workers.

Mr. Quish—Young men are fleeing the country looking for a living.

Chairman—I think we should leave the matter in the hands of the Manager. He knows our views and he may get the ear of the Department.
