KILLED IN AIR RAIDS.

During the first three years of the war 47,305 civilians were killed in air raids in Britain, states Mr. Morrison, British Home Secretary, in a written Parliamentary reply. Those injured and detained in hospital numbered 55,658. The figures for Greater London were 20,110 and 26,071, respectively.

TILLAGE IN BRITAIN.

Mr. R. S. Hudson, British Minister of Agriculture, said in the House of Commons yesterday that the area under crops in England to-day had increased by over 50 per cent. since the war began and was now greater than in 1918. The demand for home production would go on increasing.
