## WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, Sept. 30th—Cattle—Supplies slightly lighter, but a useful class. Full attendance of buyers. Small heifers, handy weights, nicely fed, had ready buyers, and touched full current rates. Fresh young beef cows steadily taken, older cows met a slower market; all beef lots firm selling trade. Enquiry for strong cattle, forward bullocks, and promising feeders; this class met brisk trade. Young stores were a good description; nice feeders and dairy heifers, also bullocks, were placed at last week's rates; small and plain types in steady demand. Proceedings over the day worked out satisfactorily, exceptionally good clearance, and substantial turnover. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £25 10s. to £29; second run, £19 15s. to £20 10s.; fat cows, best, £24 5s. to £30 5s.; second run, £18 to £21; 2½ year old bullocks and heifers, £20 to £26 15s.; second run, £16 10s. to £17 15s.; 1½ year old heifers, best, £16 10s. to £18 17s. 6d.; second run, £11 4s. to £16; 1½ year old bullocks, best, £15 10s. to £17 10s.; second run, £11 to £15 2s. 6d.; calves, £7 10s. to £10 4s.

Sheep—A very full entry, increase on last week, a better turnout of good sheep; prime sheep were in strong demand at advanced rates. Trade opened with a firm tone and quick free sale, the value barometer indicating a substantial rise, buyers operating without hesitancy gave a good "swing" to trade, with activity and cohesion; medium weights in most favour, nice hoggets wanted and easily cashed. Fresh ewes and fat lambs met strong demand, purchasers parted freely. Fair supply of store sheep and lambs, which met a better trade than last week. Market sold up early, with a strong finish. Hoggets, best, 117/- to 131/-; second run, 100/- to 114/-; stores, best, 90/- to 97/6; second run, 75/- to 87/-; ewes, best, 98/- to 109/-; second run, 78/- to 97/-; lambs, fat, best, 79/- to 97/-; stores, best, 65/- to 75/-; small, 51/- to 64/-—Wm. ## WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, Sept. 29th—The number sent forward for sale, was much heavier than last week, being the heaviest of the season. Class on sale was of an average description, and included quite a number of secondary and poor heifers and cows, which did not call for attention. Not many high grade cows on sale. The attendance was large and most representative, a number wanting choice dairy cows. Trade opened quietly, the run of values for heifers and cows was on an easier level, and prices showed a backward tendency. Choice and promising heifers and cows drew keen competition at the higher rates. Dairy cows of the right stamp met steady enquiry, buyers being willing to give top rates for top lots; secondary and old cows and heifers did not appeal to buyers, these were tedious and difficult to place. Choice young cows are wanted. On the whole business was easier than last market, but all useful lots changed hands. Mr. John Tierney, Dooradoyle, Mungret, topped the market at £30 10s. In calf and calved heifers, £24 5s. to £32 10s.; dairy cows, best, £35 to £39 10s.; promising

REGISTRATION OF TEA CUSTOMERS. On and from Saturday, 30th September, 1942, no tea customer at that shop may not sell tea at any other shop which is the page 11 of the RATION BOOK.

A LICENSED TEA RETAILER, AT PRESENT REGISTERED AS SUCH PERSON, IS OBLIGED TO REGISTER HIS EXISTING QUOTA WITH HIM FOR TEA MAY BE OBTAINED FROM HIM.

Any licensed tea retailer who has not registered his existing quota with him for tea may be refused tea.

## TEA IN EXCHANGE FOR

On and from Saturday, 30th September, 1942, no tea customer at that shop may not supply tea to a customer for the appropriate tea coupon AND SHOULD CANCEL THE COUPON AT THE TIME OF SALE. TO BE MARKED CLEARLY IN INDELIBLE PENCIL COUPON WILL BE ONE HALF OUNCE WEIGHT OF TEA TO BE DELIVERED NIGHTLY IN ADVANCE AS AT THE TIME OF SALE.

commencing Saturday, 30th September, 1942, tea coupons should be cancelled FROM THE TEA PAGE 11 OF THE RATION BOOK BY HIM INTACT AND SHOULD BE KEPT AS SUPPLIES TO INSTITUTE.

No change is being made in the tea supplies to catering establishments. DELIVERIES OF TEA TO BE MADE IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE SUPPLY OF TEA TO LICENSERS TO BE BASED ON THE RECORDS ENDED 30th JUNE, 1942.

NO CHANGE IS BEING MADE IN THE SUPPLY OF TEA TO LICENSERS TO BE BASED ON THE RECORDS ENDED 30th JUNE, 1942. From the 3rd October, 1942, tea customers will be obliged to keep in their possession a copy of the RATION BOOK, page 11, lettered C, completed at once in the space provided of the holder of the ration books of all the merchants to whom he wishes the merchants to be registered. The shopkeeper, on completing the ration book, to the ration book holder should forward the top portion of the ration books to the shopkeeper.
