WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, October 7th—Substantial increase in numbers, much more than seasonable, all pen accommodation filled. Largest supply of beef, strong, and aged cattle for the season. Big and representative attendance of buyers, including local and shipping interests. Beef in good demand, with active inquiry the better lots, particularly medium weight heifers drew appreciable competition. Young cows well done easily cashed, ready exchange; secondary sorts also met good selling trade; business in this department well up to current prices. In store cattle section forward cattle in good demand, and anything promising with quality and condition easily cashed. The best show of young calves for some time, and included many nice drafts of one and a half year old heifers and bullocks; heifers in active demand at full values. Promising young cattle freely bid for and cashed; plainer types, and cattle short of finish, also changed hands. Business was marked by a free and easy exchange, quality and condition firm demand; the nicer lots drew a bit more money than last week. All round full current rates well maintained. Calves wound up the sale with good trade at best prices. The biggest market for the year, with a heavy volume of transactions during the day, exceptionally good clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £23 10s. to £27 10s.; second run, £19 10s. to £22; fat cows, best, £22 to £28; second run, £16 15s. to £21; two and a half year old bullocks and heifers (small), £19 10s. to £23; one and a half year old heifers, best, £17 12s. 6d. to £21; second run, £11 5s. to £16 17s. 6d.; bullocks, £15 10s. to £18 7s. 6d.; second run, £11 10s. to £15 5s. Calves, best, £5 17s. 6d. to £9 10s.

Sheep—Considerable increase; on the whole mass not up to last week; demand hardly so active, and value position somewhat easier, because the sheep were not as good; prime pens commanded attention, and nicely dressed hoggets met a ready exchange; best pens freely bid for, nice medium weights in demand. Fresh ewes with quality found buyers; a good show of feeders, for which there was good enquiry. Fat lambs readily bid for, useful show of store lambs, in demand at firm rates. Strong attendance of buyers. Business in this section wound up with a strong finish, and practical clearance effected.
