quiem Office and High Mass in the
Grotto Church. Very sincere sym-
pathy is extended to Mrs. Harty,
family, and numerous relatives and
friends.

FREE SCHOOL BOOKS REQUESTED

At a meeting of the Limerick
Juvenile Advisory Committee, held
at the Employment Exchange last
week, Councillor P. Cusack, P.C.,
proposed that a request be sent to
the responsible Minister to supply
school books free to pupils who had
attained the sixth standard in the
primary schools and were anxious
to continue their education in the
secondary schools—the books to be
given free to those who were unable
to pay for them through no fault of
their parents.

THE TALBOT CLUB

Since the establishment of the
Talbot Club in November of last
year 10,118 hours' work was done
