WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, October 27th—The entry totalled greater numerical strength than last week, and included a good number of very choice heifers and cows. There was a strong attendance, several from a distance, and all in quest of cows and heifers showing dairy qualities; this description found ready and willing purchasers, with a quick sale; spirited competition and advanced values all round; bidding for this class started at £30, and quickly ran up to £49, after sharp competition; one outstanding calved heifer, the property of Mrs. Baker, Rosbrien, Limerick, realising the record figure of £68, the buyer after spirited bidding being Mr. T. J. Horgan, Blackrock, Cork. All round proceedings manifested a firmness and stability on the higher basis of values, with a bright business activity; buyers on the look out for top lots were not disappointed. Choice incalf heifers were in exceptional demand. Top price for cows went to Mr. John Keays, Abington, at £49. The market was easily the best for the autumn season, winding up strong, with a practical clearance, and marked the biggest turnover and best trade of the year. Dairy cows and incalf heifers—Entry something less than last week's total, but again included a very large proportion of really good cows and heifers, for which trade was again extra good, resulting in the highest prices this season so far being obtained, practically all the good cows and heifers being sold under the hammer, at prices which in a good many cases exceeded vendors' expectations. In the very best of company, Mr. Peter Ryan, Kilmore, Co. Clare, topped the market at £48 for a dairy cow, Mr. Michael O'Grady, Rosmadda, Blackwater, being the runner-up at £47 10s. for a calved cow. Dairy cows and incalf heifers, best, £47 10s. to £48; second run, £40 10s. to £41 10s.; others, £33 to £38; small, £20 to £31.

Stores—Entry not up to previous week's high level but included a strong seasonable entry, mostly comprising young stores; trade not as free as previous markets but with a strong attendance of buyers; trade on the whole was good and a heavy volume of business was transacted on the day.
