seeds or fertilisers, in addition to the sum calculated at the rate of 5 per cent. to cover interest and administrative expenses, same to be repaid at the end of the next harvest, but in any case not later than the 31st December, 1942.

6. The Secretary of the County Council is authorised to receive applications and select applicants, and in the case of doubt to act on the advice of such committees as have a knowledge of agricultural circumstances, such advice to be obtained in writing.

7. Every applicant and his sureties must have discharged all obligations for rates up to the 1st March, 1942. In the case of a tenant the rent receipt must be produced instead of the rate receipt.

8. Applicants are requested to take steps to insure that they are not charged for seeds and fertilisers unless suppliers shall not exceed the ordinary prevailing market price or the controlled price. This is of vital importance to applicants themselves as they will be liable upon to repay in full the amount charged for the said commodities together with interest at the prescribed rate.

9. The County Council shall not assume responsibility for the supply of seeds and fertilisers without an official order. Applications will not be paid prices in excess of the controlled price.

10. The term "suppliers" necessarily mean seed merchants.

11. Form of application for seeds must be completed in duplicate, including the filling and sealing of the form of guarantee at the time of application. Completed forms, which a 6d. stamp must be affixed in the place indicated, should be sent to the County Secretary not later than 15th April, 1943, after which no further applications will be considered.
