Monday, November 3rd—Entries were again on the heavy side, something more in demand than last week, the bulk being dairy cows and included a good many well bred and heifers with colour, quality and quantity. The good prices obtained last week attracted vendors; no dearth of attendance being both large and representative, and everyone seemed to be a customer and wanting the right stamp. Business marked with a strong and active demand for cows and heifers showing promise of being good milkers, and anything with such qualities was readily bought up, top prices being paid. There was brisk demand for choice cows and heifers, customers bidding specially for this class; strong and active demand for anything with promise of quality. Rough and poor cows and heifers slower trade. Business in general on a bright aspect, and to the end of the week moved in an active groove, the higher prices of last week's market being easily obtained. The sale was one of the best of the season. Market practically sold up. Top price for dairy cows was obtained by Mr. Ruttle, Clarina, at £51 10s., the runner-up Mr. C. Smyth, Deegarty, Kilmoran, at £48 10s. for a calved cow. Top price for heifers went to Mr. Jos. Bridgeman, Keela, Askeaton, and Mr. James Keane, Curra, Kilmore, at £40 each. 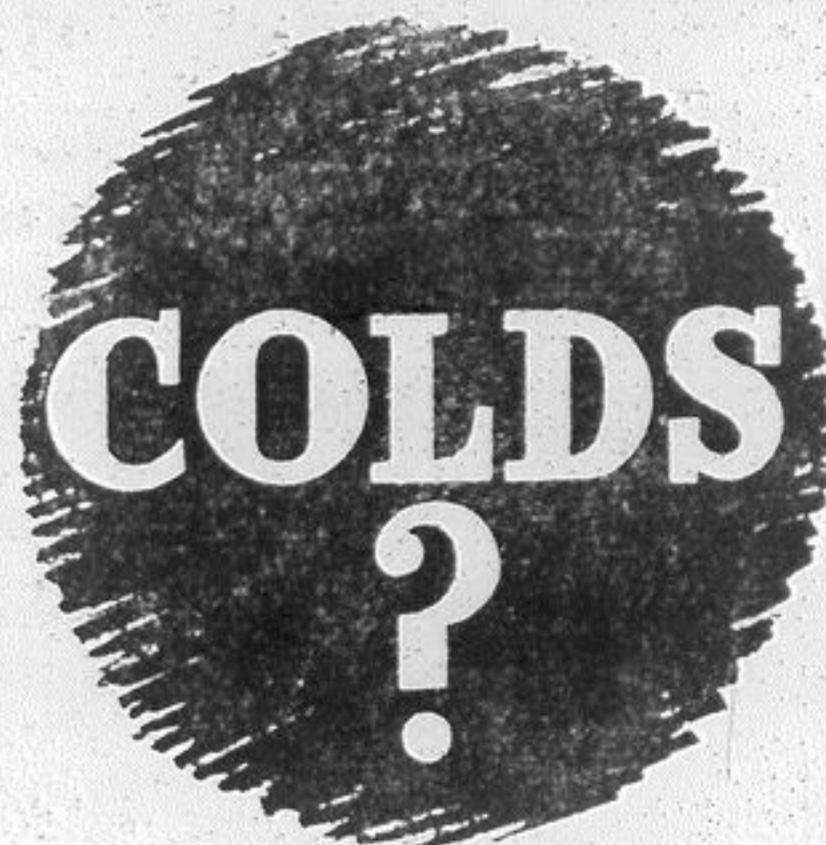
