All round trade hardly as bright as last week, buyers operating cautiously; all the same there was a substantial turnover and good clearance. WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, November 10th—The entry for to-day's market was the heaviest of the season, composed of a mixed class. Shortage of high grade cows, for which there is still strong demand. The attendance was large and representative. Trade was not as active or firm as last Tuesday, as buyers had not the same standard to select from, although best class heifers and cows made full values, and touched top rates. In some cases customers were not willing to trade at the high figure vendors held out for, and where reasonable terms were offered exchange was readily effected, and in the case of high class cows or heifers competition was keen; demand continues strong for choice and promising cows and heifers; steady selling trade where owners accepted market values. Trade for middling and secondary cows and heifers was quieter than recent markets. An exceptionally fine outstanding dairy cow, the property of Mr. Malachy McKenna, Borrisokane, realised the record price so far this season of £52, the purchaser being Mr. T. J. Horgan, Cork. The runner-up was Mr. James Conheady, Newmarket-on-Fergus, at £45, to Mrs. Hastings, Friarstown House. Promising incalf heifers were also in keen demand, top price of the market went to Mr. P. Fitzgerald, Mount Rice, Kilmore, at £39 10s. Business over the day worked out with a record turnover, and finished strong with a good clearance.
