WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, November 18th—Cattle—Heavy entry again forwarded, all accommodation filled. Strong and representative attendance of export and home buyers. Beer, good supply; had plenty of customers at full current values, and wanted, especially nice medium heifers and cross A/A bullocks; rates in this department favourable to vendors. Small entry of cows; useful fresh young cows cashed, half finished lots not in favour. Nicely forward cattle and feeders changed hand, and wanted, for the right stamp prices up to previous level. The plain run and thin stores tedious. A heavy supply of young stores, including many choice drafts of dairy heifers and bullocks; a steady tone reflected in operations, but hardly as ready or quick as previous markets. Generally last week's terms had to be paid, especially for nice 1½ year old heifers, roans preferential demand; rough and backward cattle hard to negotiate. Calves with colour and quality sold well. In the general run of business—a quieter tone ruled, unless for choice lots. Over the day a substantial turnover and exceptionally good clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £21 to £27; second run, £17 15s. to £20; fat cows, best, £21 10s. to £27 10s.; second run, £14 to £21; 2½ year old heifers and bullocks, £20 to £22 10s.; second run, £17 2s. 6d. to £19 10s.; 1½ year old heifers, £17 17s. 6d. to £21 10s.; second run, £14 5s. to £16; bullocks, best, £16 10s. to £21 5s.; second run, £11 to £16; calves, best, £10 10s. to £13 5s.; second run, £7 17s. to £9 5s.

Sheep—Lighter supply, on the whole class not up to last week, less good sheep. Trade hardly as active as last Wednesday, and prices accordingly were a bit easier; pens with quality and nicely done met ready exchange; best pens freely bid for; nice middle weight hoggets in demand. Fresh ewes with quality found buyers. Old ewes difficult to cash. In some case vendors of best sheep stood out for top rates of recent markets, which buyers were not forced to part, and consequently concession required to effect exchange. A good show of feeders, for which there was fair enquiry. Fat lambs scarce, the right stamp cashed. Useful store lambs in demand at easier terms. Average attendance and satisfactory clearance effected. Hoggets, best, 11/- to 120/-; second run, 98/- to 106/-; stores, 80/- to 94/-; ewes, 85/- to 107/6; lambs, best, 66/- to 77/-; stores, 50/- to 65/-. Wm. B. Fitt and Co., Auctioneers.
