DEATH OF RETIRED IRISH JUDGE

The death occurred in Dablan, vesterday, of Mr. Gerald Fitz-gibbon. L.L.D., who was for 14 years a Justice of the Supreme Court of Eire. He retired in 1931. He was elected member of Partiament for Dublin University in 1912, and in the first Parliament of the Irish Free State was one of the four Deputies representing the University of Dublin.
