DESTITUTE FAMILIES

Mr. D. O'Keeffe (Clare County
Magistrate) has made an order that
all destitute families are not
to be admitted to the Clare County
Home. Food, lodging and medical
attendance must be provided for
destitute families by the Home Assist-
ant Officer without sending them
to the County Home, which is an
institution only for the aged, infirm,
chronic hospital cases and harm-
fully insane. A few families evicted
from their dwellings in Ennis, which
is a menace to public health,
admitted to the County Home, are
now discharged under the new

order. His wage was paid for a period after

The Justice said that he was not
satisfied with the claim made by the
plaintiff and he would accordingly
dismiss the case.

DEATH OF RETIRED IRISH JUDGE

The death occurred in Dublin,
yesterday, of Mr. Gerald Fitz-
gibbon, LL.D., who was for 14
years a Justice of the Supreme
Court of Eire. He retired in 1931.
He was elected member of Parlia-
ment for Dublin University in
1912, and in the first Parliament of
the Irish Free State was one of
the four Deputies representing
the University of Dublin.
