The lists of the Championship winners have been brought up to date, while the All-Ireland winners and finalists have been carefully checked, with the result that these can now be safely taken as correct. Descriptions of the All-Ireland Finals are a special feature. Also included are particulars of the 1942 Championship campaign, with scores in all games played during the season. There is a foreword in Irish by Very Rev. M. Hamilton, Adm., the well-known Clare Gael, in which tribute is paid to the late P. J. Devlin ("Celt"), who first conceived the idea of publishing the Annual. Further tribute is paid to "Celt" by S. S. O Ceallaigh ("Seoilg"), and another article of more than ordinary interest deals with the work of a Club. There is a year by year synopsis of the activities of the G.A.A., so that the Annual is an essential book of reference for everybody interested in G.A.A. affairs.
