

Death of Sir Vincent Nash

With feelings of the most sincere regret we record the passing at his residence, Shannon View, Kilmurry, Limerick, of Sir Vincent Nash, which occurred on Wednesday last, after a rather protracted illness in his 77th year.

Deceased, who was a most estimable gentleman, was son of Mr James Nash, J.P., and was principal of the firm of Messrs J H Nash & Sons, Estate Agents Limerick. He was High Sheriff of Limerick in 1902, when he was knighted by King Edward VII, and in 1909 was created a Knight Commander of the Order of St Gregory by Pope Pius X.

He took a keen interest in his native city and had been a Deputy Lieutenant, a County Grand Juror and a Justice of the Peace.

Sir Vincent received his early education at the Crescent College, Limerick. He got his Degree of Medicine at Dublin University, but never practised. He was associated actively with every charitable movement in Limerick. He was Governor of St John's Hospital, Limerick, and was with the late Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer, a founder of the St Vincent De Paul Nursing Association, of which he was Hon. Treas., holding a similar position in the City Fuel and Blanket Fund.

He married in 1886 Miss May Haran, elder daughter of Mr James Haran, Manager of the National Bank, Limerick, and he is survived by Lady Nash, two sons and three daughters, who have the deep sympathy of the people of Limerick in their great sorrow.
